	The Solutions Action Plan is a tool developed by TASC's Center for Health and Justice and PTACC's National Leadership Council (NLC)to help sites develop deflection strategies that will be ready to implement immediately upon return to their communities. The tool is a real plan, not just an exercise. Planning will start by having the team clearly state the problem to be addressed, and determine the desired outcome by defining what success looks like and the "why" it matters to do deflection.
	The plan will then guide the team through steps including identifying system partners, action steps, and how the initiative will be evaluated and sustained. Each site will have one-on-one guided facilitation and access to subject matter experts (SME) who will help them through the process as they follow the tool and develop their deflection solutions action plan (SAP)
